DOROTHY MACARDLE: A BIOGRAPHY



"She is not a minor Irish revwriter but someone with a multi-faceted outlook on life; a major talent, whose real worth has been drowned in the paean of political and historical isionism

Dorothy Macardle (1889-1958) was born into a prominent Dundalk brewing family. Her father was a 'Home Ruler' and her English mother a Unionist. Educated at Alexandra College and University College Dublin, she lectured at Alexandra during the war of independence, rejected her own social and political background and become an ardent republican, working secretly in Sinn Féin's publicity bureau and living with Maud Gonne. Arrested for her antitreaty propagandist work, she was incarcerated without trial, went on hunger-strike and was subjected to torture and beatings.

She is remembered for her monumental study *The Irish Republic* (1937), a major history of Ireland's struggle for independence, commissioned by Eamon DeValera. Macardle's own struggle for independence led to radical breaks with him when she fought against the reduced status of women in the 1937 Constitution, and Ireland's neutrality during the second World War. She was aware of the menacing rise of Fascism and moved to London as a journalist during the war years. Her humanitarian report *Children of Europe* is a vital account of the plight of displaced and orphaned children across Europe in the direct aftermath of World War II. President of the Irish Association of Civil Liberty. She broadcast regularly on Radio Éireann and BBC, toured the USA giving lectures and was awarded an honorary doctorate.

An accomplished novelist and playwright. *The Uninvited* (1941) was turned into a Hollywood horror masterpiece. Her early play *Ann Kavanagh* was a miniature classic of the Abbey Theatre one act form. Her literary work was central to her sense of self throughout her life

a poet, playwright, novelist, historian, feminist, progressive politician and internationalist in the true sense of the term – she declared herself to be an unrepentant propagandist, and espoused the causes she knew to be those of truth and justice."

PROPOSAL

Dorothy Macardle Archive & Performance Project. Phase 1: *Prison Notebooks*

The Dorothy Macardle Archive and Performance Project is an arts initiative established by independent theatre maker and Writer Declan Gorman, working in partnership with academic & performer Sharon McArdle. Using the medium of theatre and public art, it aims to reflect upon the life and artistic legacy of Dundalk born, Dorothy Macardle.

The First of a series of creative pieces planned for this project is entitled 'Prison Notebooks' a new play co written by Declan Gorman and Sharon (currently at 'work in progress' stage), intended for solo performance, based primarily on first-hand journals and other writings undertaken by Dorothy Macardle over the course of her six-month incarceration as a Republican prisoner during the Irish Civil War of 1922-23. Already an Abbey playwright at the time of her arrest, Dundalk-born Macardle (1889-1958) went on to become a major literary artist, Hollywood screen writer, historian and international human rights advocate. Her gaol writings, undertaken in the most oppressive conditions of deprivation, uncertainty and confinement reveal not only a dedicated political activist and thinker but a developing artist of stature.

Funding is sought to allow Declan Gorman and Sharon Mc Ardle develop 'Prison Notebooks' from work in progress stage to a full stage performance piece, which will be presented at Dundalk Gaol and Kilmainham Gaol in May 2020, before going on National tour to site specific venues.

Prison Notebooks

Presented in Association with An Táin Arts Centre. Devised and written by Sharon McArdle and Declan Gorman

'Prison Notebooks' was presented at 'Work in Progress stage' last December at An Táin Arts Centre and took the form of a staged reading and presentation of episodic scenes, a moderated post-show Q&A and an exhibition of artefacts.

Development of this work was made possible with the support of an Arts Council Theatre Projects Award. Funding is now sought to allow Declan Gorman and Sharon Mc Ardle develop 'Prison Notebooks' from work in progress stage to a full stage performance piece, which will be presented at Dundalk Gaol and Kilmainham Gaol in May 2020, before going on National tour to site specific venues.








Archive Samples of Dorothy Macardle's Gaol Journal, 1922

Biographies

- Declan Gorman (Director) is a playwright, director, educator and performer. His solo show "The Dubliners Dilemma" (after Joyce) has toured extensively in Ireland and to USA, Norway, Russia and India where it played alongside his drama "The Big Fellow", based on Frank O'Connor's biography of Michael Collins at Mumbai Literature Live 2017. He was formerly Artistic Director of Upstate Theatre, Drogheda, where he staged his "Border Chronicles Trilogy 1998-2007". He is a past winner of a BBC Stewart Parker Award, holds and M.Phil in Creative Writing from TCD; was awarded an Arts Council Theatre Bursary in 2018 and teaches on the New York University Study Abroad Programme in Community-Engaged Theatre.
- Sharon McArdle (Performer) is currently pursuing a PhD through Creative Practice at DCU on the life and works of Dorothy Macardle. Sharon trained as an Actor at Rose Bruford College, UK. Over recent years, she has been building a repertoire of pieces, predominantly one person shows, centering on culturally or historically notable Irish women with a view to performing in places significant to the people in question. Prior to Dorothy Macardle's 'Prison Notebooks', she toured a one-woman show, Brontë: A Solo Portrait of Charlotte, by William Luce. The piece was commissioned by Armagh City & Craigavon Borough Council to commemorate the bicentennial of the birth of the author. Her research interests lie in Women and Children's Rights, Socially Engaged Arts Practice and Asylum and Refugee narratives. She is a member of the Dorothy Macardle Society and presented at 'An Unrepentant Propagandist', Devised by Constance Short with Peter Berresford Ellis as conference consultant.




History and Human Rights

My practice has always included a strong element of community engagement and, whether directing with professional ensembles, leading community arts processes or (more recently) working in schools contexts, I have sought to combine principles of inclusivity with a quest for artistic innovation and excellence.

Prison Notebooks is the first phase of a series of works which will be presented as part of the Dorothy Macardle Archive and Performance Project. It is intended in 2020-22 to collaborate with a group of empanelled artists and partners through archive research; workshop experimentation and occasional work-in-progress showings to explore the following aspects of Macardles life.

- Radicalisation through the Irish Literary Movement & the Abbey: Connecting with the Abbey and other archives – experimental presentations in recreated literary salons and Edwardian theatre spaces
- Gothic Horror Novelist & Hollywood Writer: Mining Dorothy's books for narrative; drawing from mid-20th century horror cinema for lighting, sound and dramatic conventions experimental presentations in disused cinema
- UN Humanitarian work in aftermath of WW2: An in-depth reading of Dorothy's immense humanitarian work for the U.N.reflections on the Holocaust, carpet bombing of cities and the plight of unaccompanied refugee minors, then and now.














3. UN Humanitarian work in aftermath of WW2

Macardle, while working with the UN was directly involved in the social reform programme in the aftermath of WW2. She was Ireland's main contact in Europe where she sought to ensure that Irish governmental aid got to its proper destinations. Her Book Children of Europe: A study of the children of liberated countries; their wartime experiences, their reactions, and their needs, with a note on Germany (1948) accounts the devastating experiences she witnessed of orphaned and refugee children, as she travelled across 20 countries in Europe after WW2.
